

# *Autumn 2008* Psychology Courses at OSU Marion

**GENERAL PSYCHOLOGY 100** will be offered daily at **MW 8-10am, F 9** (502218) by Dr. Pettijohn [there is an **honors** section, **E100** (502265), offered by Dr. Pettijohn, which requires additional reading, discussion, and writing]; **TR 12:45-3p**, (502223) by Dr Tylka; **MW 1-3pm** (502239) by Ashleigh Richard, and **TR 5:30-7:45pm** (502250) by Mrs. Hazelett. This is the introductory course, and is the prerequisite for advanced studies in psychology. It covers the range of psychology subfields, including psychobiology, development, perception, learning, cognition, motivation, personality, clinical, and social psychology, and focuses on the scientific approach.

**HOW TO STUDY 120N** (Academic and Personal Effectiveness) will be taught **MW 5:30-7pm** (502229) by Mrs. Hazelett. This how to study course helps students improve study skills by focusing on how to take effective lecture notes, how to read and study textbooks, and how to take tests. Academic and Personal Effectiveness 120, is for any student who needs a jump-start on study skills and college survival. Psych 120 does not have any prerequisites.

**ABNORMAL PSYCHOLOGY 331** will be taught **TR 3-5p** (502314) by Dr. Tracy Tylka. This 5-credit course provides an overview of many psychological disorders (anxiety disorders, mood disorders, schizophrenia, dissociative disorders, personality disorders, and eating disorders). We will explore the nature of these disorders, their manifest symptoms, potential causes, and current treatment approaches. The discussion of causes will include the contributions made by psychological, relational, sociocultural, and biological factors. Case examples for each disorder will be presented. The current classification system (DSM-IV) will be used to define and illustrate the disorders. Prerequisite is Psychology 100.

**SOCIAL PSYCHOLOGY 367.01** (2nd Writing Course) will explore the various ways people think, feel, and behave in social situations. This course, taught **MW 1-3pm** (502230) by Dr. Kristi Costabile, offers a broad introduction to the scientific study of human social influence and interaction. The course will cover topics such as the social self-concept, social judgment, attitudes, persuasion, conformity, aggression, altruism, prejudice, and romantic relationships. Social Psych is a 5-credit hour second level writing course, with prerequisite of English 110 and sophomore status. Because this class fulfills your second-level writing requirement, course assignments will emphasize writing and communicating effectively.

**HISTORICAL DEVELOPMENT IN PSYCHOLOGY (HISTORY OF PSYCHOLOGY) 505** will be taught **MW 10-12n** (502335) by Dr. Terry Pettijohn. Psychology 505 is "a consideration of the development of modern scientific psychology from the roots in the school of the 19th century to its contemporary status." This 5 credit history of psychology course will help students understand historical influences on modern psychology. It traces development of the field, from the antecedents of the discipline to the founding of the science of psychology through the major schools of thought (structuralism, functionalism, Gestalt, behaviorism, and psychoanalysis). Most interesting to psychology majors/ minors, it is open to anyone and will help students understand intellectual thinking of the past century. It will help students better appreciate psychological thought and theory in other courses. Prerequisite is Psych 100. See advisor if you have trouble with registering.

Three courses are also offered at the Delaware Center: General Psychology **100E** is taught MW 5:30-7:45pm (502244) by Dr. Fohl-Bailey. Academic and Personal Effectiveness **120E** is offered MW 1:30-3pm (502286) by Dr. Fohl-Bailey.

**RESEARCH METHODS IN PSYCHOLOGY 300E** is taught at the Delaware Center **TR 1-3pm** (502309) by Dr. Fohl-Bailey. Goals include 1) understanding research designs, 2) searching research literature, 3) writing in APA style, and 4) conducting original research. Students will be involved in reviewing the research literature in psychology, writing in APA style, and conducting original research. This course is required of all psychology majors and minors.
